Montauk State Park

Montauk State Park is near Salem (Hwy 19) and Licking (Hwy 63) Missouri. It has 1,396 acres and was acquired in 1926. There are seven springs within Montauk State Park forming the headwaters of the Current River. The park features an old gristmill, campgrounds, cabins, and motel with a dining lodge, hiking and picnicking.

Many trout fishermen consider Montauk State Park the finest of the three Missouri trout parks. Montauk has three miles of stream before its flows into the blue ribbon waters of the Current River. The park has secluded areas where a fisherman can fish completely alone. A portion of the Current River within the park has been modified with boulder placed in specific areas, but the majority of the waters appear in a natural state. There are some boulders placed here and there to enhance the structure and shelter for the fish, but there is minimal channelization and bank access is not uniformly wide open. While bait fishermen tend to focus their efforts on the big pools with easy bank access, there are a couple of miles of textbook trout stream that get little attention even during the peak of the tourist season.

The U. S. Congress passed a law in 1964 to preserve America's free-flowing streams, by making the Current River and its sister river, the Jacks Fork, a national park named the Ozark National Scenic Riverways. The nation's first river-based national park; its start at Montauk State Park flowing 134 miles to Arkansas. This water is cold enough for trout; the river is home to resident bald eagles, great blue herons, belted kingfishers and other wildlife. The upper stretches from Montauk to Cedar Grove, Cedar Grove to Akers, Akers to Pulltite and Pulltite to Round Spring all are excellent day floats, passing gravel bars perfect for camping and turquoise springs that boost the river's flow. Summer Saturdays are crowded. Spring, fall and winter, after a snowfall, are best for a quiet wilderness experience.

The park offers the opportunity to relax and unwind to even those that do not fish. There are picnic pavilions, playgrounds, hiking trails, and a great floating river downstream of the park, and of course the trout hatchery is fun to visit. The park store also has a very nice restaurant and an ice cream shop.

Check it out and you may find this park a place for you and your family to spent time together.
